The cost of living, current trends



- UK inflation continues to remain at a high level, with the largest upward contributing factor being the rising cost of food.
- Food and non-alcoholic beverage prices rose by 13.1% in the 12 months to August 2022, up 0.4 percentage points from July and the highest rate since August 2008.
- The Consumer Prices Index including owner occupiers' housing costs (CPIH) rose by 8.6% in the 12 months to August 2022, down from 8.8% in July.
- The Consumer Prices Index (CPI) rose by 9.9% in the 12 months to August 2022, down from 10.1% in July.


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
Heating

Average energy bills are expected to rise by £1,493 in October, which will be offset by government support up to £1,200 for those in the lowest income decile. Using historic price elasticity for domestic gas demand, this price rise will result in a reduction in energy consumption of between 10% and 30%, depending on the household's income. Lower income households are more likely to respond to higher energy prices by cutting energy use below safe levels. This could itself have direct health implications and compound with covid and flu risks this winter.

The Marmot Review Team estimated that 21.5% of all excess winter deaths can be attributed due to homes being cold. A 2001 study suggested that death rates rise 2.8% for every Celsius degree drop in the external temperature for those in the coldest 10% of homes, compared with 0.9% in the warmest homes. Estimates suggest that for every cold-related death there are eight non-fatal hospital admissions. These estimates are based on **data form 1986-1996** and are **associative only**. Cardiovascular and respiratory mortality are the disease categories most responsive to cold weather.

The UKHSA Cold Weather Plan for England will be published in October, this will outline when health services can expect most cold-related demand. For this Winter, enacting the Cold Weather Plan in combination with planning for COVID-19 and influenza will be vital to maintaining health service effectiveness. Cold Homes Kill

Beware of heating risks

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- Reduce fire risk from open fires and portable heaters
- Un-swept chimneys or damp wood can start chimney fires
- Install a carbon monoxide monitor
- You can ask the fire service for a free home safety visit
- Check your electric blanket is safe to use.

Damp and mould

- Causes breathing problems
- Makes asthma worse
- Can cause damage to possessions and buildings
- You can deal with damp and mould by following the steps provided on our web page. If you rent your home, you can also alert your landlord.

Cold causes blood to thicken and blood pressure to rise, increasing the risk of stroke and heart attack

Heat your home to at least 18°C

- Did you know?
- Below 16°C breathing becomes more difficult
- Below 12°C there is strain on the heart and risk of
- heart attack
- Below 9°C can cause hypothermia and risk of death

If you are struggling to afford to keep your home heated to at least 18°C...

keep warm and well

Plan to keep just one or two rooms warm safely

- · Check out the best way to use your heating system
- Use your heating controls and thermostatic radiator valves (TRVs)
- Maintain ventilation and air flow to avoid damp and mould

Keep yourself warm

- · Wear several light layers of warm clothes
- Keep active indoors
- Have hot drinks and meals
- Use hot water bottles or wheat bags


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- Sign them up: Priority services register
