# Overview of Education Investment Areas (EIAs) and Priority Areas

- In the Levelling Up White Paper (Feb 2022), we identified **55 Education Investment Areas** (EIAs) where we will implement a package of measures to drive school improvement and improve pupil outcomes. We also indicated that we would make more intensive investment across a number of these areas.
- In the Schools White Paper (Mar 2022), we identified **24 Priority Areas** where we will make more intensive investment. They are a subset of EIAs, and comprise of the 12 existing DfE Opportunity Areas and 12 other EIAs that have particularly low attainment and high rates of disadvantage.

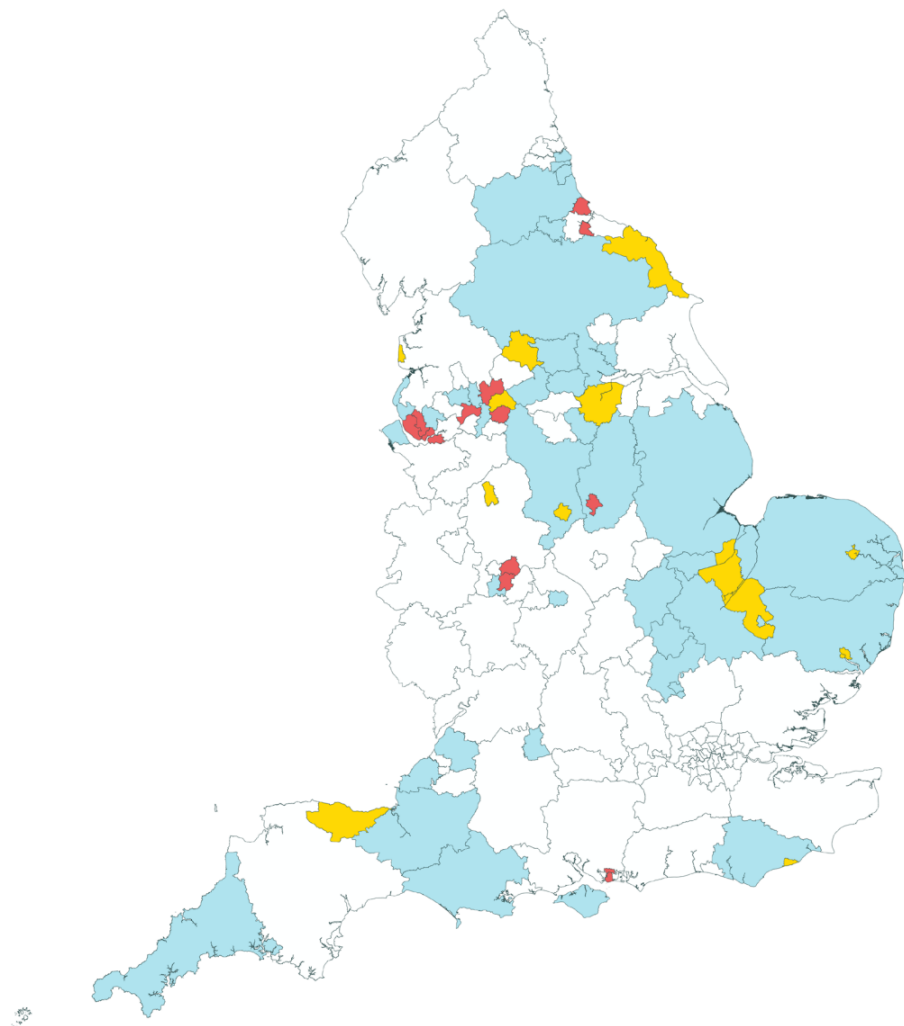
## Ambitions by 2030:

- 90% of pupils meeting the expected standard in reading, writing, and maths combined at Key Stage 2, with an increase of over a third in the lowest performing areas.
- National GCSE average grade in both English language and in maths increased from 4.5 in 2019 to 5

## How we will do this in Priority Areas:

- We will build on our support to Education Investment Areas in Priority Areas - making even more intensive investment to strengthen the system and address local need, so we can drive improvements in pupils' numeracy and literacy further and faster.

# Local needs fund and local partnerships boards

## Local needs fund

- In the Schools White Paper we announced that across the **24 Priority Areas** we are investing around **£42 million of additional funding for bespoke interventions to address local needs.**
- They will act in an advisory capacity, bringing their expertise to identify local improvement priorities and develop a delivery plan, which will set out how DfE programmes and selected local programmes will lead to improved attainment at KS2 and KS4.
- They include representatives from the local authority, strong multi-academy trusts, and local dioceses, and also individuals from inside and outside the area who bring specific skills, expertise and challenge.
- They will meet regularly to provide ongoing challenge and oversight of programme delivery, and operate under a nationally consistent set of terms of reference.

The **initial priorities** for the local partnership boards are to complete a data-led analysis of local needs, and contribute to the development of an evidence-based delivery plan (by end of November) of how to invest their share of the £42m local needs fund.

# Opportunities for Hastings

- Access to extra investment and priority DfE programmes.
- To be part of a national initiative that allows the PA board to form a bespoke approach to meeting the needs of Hastings.
- Lead the discussion to decide how best to allocate Hastings's share of the local needs funding.
- To be able to shape local delivery of interventions.
- Support interventions to help make system improvements that will benefit current and future cohorts.
- Bringing key people together from across the area to improve outcomes for children and young people to improve throughout Hastings.
- To be able to learn from other Priority Areas across the country and to share good practice from Hastings to help others.
